



GRAND PRIZE WINNER ANNOUNCED FOR ANA NATIONAL COIN WEEK CLUB EVENT



Sam Itzin from Tucson, Arizona, is the grand prize winner in the American Numismatic Association's 2007 National Coin Week club event. Itzin won a First Spouse \$10 gold coin, valued at more than \$400 and generously provided by Numismatic Guaranty Corporation (NGC).

On April 15, 60 ANA clubs across the country spend quarters marked with special National Coin Week stickers. The stickers directed people to the ANA's website, where contact information about participating clubs could be found. People who recovered marked quarters responded, resulting in over 30 local prize winners and many more entrants in the grand prize drawing held on May 13.

"I'm thrilled to win this prize, and I think it's a great promotional idea," said Itzin. "I manage a coffee shop, and found the marked coin in my tip jar. I've always been a casual coin collector, but I never knew about the Tucson Coin Club until now!"

UNITED STATES MINT LIMITS EXPORTATION & MELTING OF COINS

Washington - The United States Mint announced a final rule to limit the exportation, melting, or treatment of one-cent (penny) and 5-cent (nickel) United States coins, to safeguard against a potential shortage of these coins in circulation.

"The new rule safeguards the integrity of U.S. coinage and protects taxpayers from bearing the costs to replace coins withdrawn from circulation," said United States Mint Director Edmund C. Moy.

The rising commodity prices of copper, nickel and zinc have increased the value of the metal in both pennies and nickels so that the content of these coins now exceeds their face value. There is concern that speculators could remove pennies and nickels from circulation and sell them as scrap for profit.

The United State Mint has received inquiries from the public over the past several months concerning the metal value of these coins and whether it is legal to melt them. Widespread withdrawal of pennies and nickels from circulation could cause coin shortages, and it would be extremely costly to replenish them, given prevailing metal prices and production costs.

Specifically the newly enacted final regulation prohibits, with certain exceptions, the exportation, melting or treatment of onecent and 5-cent coins.

Some of the exceptions allow for small amounts of these coins to be exported as pocket change, and for recreational and numismatic purposes. Other exceptions include the treatment of minor quantities of these coins for educational, amusement, novelty, jewelry and similar purposes. The new regulation authorizes a fine of not more than \$10,000.00, or imprisonment of not more than five years, or both, against a person who knowingly violates the regulation. In addition, by law, any coins exported, melted, or treated in violation of the regulation shall be forfeited to the United State Government.

TNA BOARD MEETING REPORT

May 18, 2007

he TNA Board met on May 19, 2007 at the TNA Convention and Show held at Will Rogers Center in Fort Worth, Texas. The meeting was Chaired by President Joe Olson.

The following Board members were in attendance: President Joe Olson, First Vice President Jim Bevill, Second Vice President Ginger Pike, Secretary Hal Cherry, Treasurer Ray Leggett, Past President Jerry Williams, and Governors Russell Prinzinger, William Welsh, James Harding, Mike Egger, Lawrence Herrera, David Burke, Gober Pitzer, Pat Curran, Doug Hershey, Tom Bennington, Rob Robinson, Barbara Williams, and Paul Garner. Also attending was TNA News Editor Ron Kersey.

Reading of the Minutes of the prior Board Meeting was waived and they were approved as published. Secretary Hal Cherry reported TNA had 554 members as of May 1, 2007. This includes 127 Life Members, 32 Junior Members, and 35 Chapter Members. There are now 601 members as 47 people either joined the TNA or renewed their membership at this Convention.

Treasurer Ray Leggett reported cash assets as of May 17, 2007 were \$125,548.80. For the fiscal year ending February 28, 2007, expenditures exceeded receipts by \$7,835.53. The required Corporate Resolution was passed to permit continuation of our banking functions since there will be a new Board taking office on May 20, 2007.

The estimated income from the 2007 Show is expected to be approximately \$5,000.00. The 2008 Show and Convention is scheduled May 15 through 18 at the Will Rogers Center in Fort Worth. Ginger and David Pike will be the Show Producers. The TNA is also negotiating with Heritage Auctions on having auctions at future TNA Conventions.

The October, 2006 TNA Show held in El Paso produced income of \$323.85 for the TNA. The Fall 2007 TNA Show will be held in Waco at the Texas Ranger Museum on November 16 and 17. There will be approximately 50 tables at this show.

TNA's various Youth Programs include Coins for A's, the Kids' Auction held at the Annual Convention and the new Junior Members Newsletter that was started last year. Reports on all of these programs indicate they are within budget and are receiving positive feedback.

Numerous positive comments have been received regarding the larger format for the TNA News. Additional improvements such as four color printing are planned for Hal Cherry Secretary



the future. The cost and budget for the TNA News was discussed and an approximate 25% increase in advertising rates was approved. Advertising rates have been the same since 1991.

The Book Auction was the best it has been in several years and after the Convention the final receipts totaled \$1,414.00.

Our Library has had no activity the past six months but the Web Site has been extremely busy with an average of more than 8,000 visits a month for this year. There were 11 competitive exhibits entered at this year's Convention and Show.

Incoming President Jim Bevill reported that progress on the TNA sponsored exhibit of Texas related numismatic items at the Alamo is coming along slowly due to construction of new facilities not having begun at the Alamo. A modified version of the exhibit is now on display at the Sterling Bank in Houston.

The TNA could not reach an agreement with ANA in modifying our scholarship to the ANA Summer Seminar and the Board voted to discontinue this program.

The By-Laws were amended to allow the TNA Board to consider and vote on emergency matters that might arise between regular Board Meetings by either e-mail or postal mail. There was also discussion on amending the By-Laws regarding elections and various associated deadlines to simplify running for office and election procedures. A formal proposal to change the By-Laws will be presented at the next Board Meeting.

Governor Paul Garner made a proposal to reestablish the outstanding TNA Club of the Year Award and this was tabled until the next Board Meeting to permit Board Members the opportunity to study his proposal.

It was noted that the Editor and Web Master are authorized to edit and approve the content and advertising of the TNA News and Web Site, respectively. They are directed to discuss any issues they might have in this area with the President.

The Board expressed appreciation for all of the donations of numismatic items, materials, and money made to the TNA and its various programs. The Board also recognizes and thanks the time and efforts of the many volunteers that help make our programs successful.

This report covers highlights of the Board Meeting and does not reflect the entire contents of the office Minutes.

NATIONAL COIN WEEK & SAN JACINTO DAY DOUBLE THE FUN!

ach year, the American Numismatic Association (ANA) celebrates National Coin Week with exhibits, presentations and activities to educate the public about the joys of collecting and studying coins and paper money. This year, the ANA event coincided with the San Jacinto Day celebration on April 21, which commemorates the 171st anniversary of the



battle which secured Texas Independence. The TNA was able to double the fun and celebrate both National Coin Week and San Jacinto Day through a paper money exhibit which

transcended these historical disciplines.

This year's ANA theme "The Presidents are Coming" recently took a unique Texas twist in Houston as the TNA expanded this emphasis on history by including

the Presidents of the Republic of Texas whose signatures graced the paper money of the period.

The TNA was recently asked by the Dallas Historical Society, the Friends of the San Jacinto Battleground and Sterling Bank to create a historical artifact and paper money exhibit on the Republic of Texas 1836-1846. The exhibit opened in conjunction with the "Patron's Reception" for the Battle of San Jacinto Symposium on April 13th . This was a private party for benefactors, historians, researchers and this year, numismatists. The symposium is a speaker's forum with stimulating scholarly research on different aspects of Texas history in the era of the Texas Revolution. It was a wonderful event, a private reception with excellent food, good wine and a host of award winning writers from across the country. The exhibit opened to the public on April 16 and ran until May 4 at the Memorial branch of Sterling Bank in Houston.

In addition to celebrating Texas Independence, the exhibit featured Texas Presidents Sam Houston and Mirabeau B. Lamar and Mexican President Santa Anna. It included a virtually complete collection of each of the six different series of paper money used during the era of the Texas Republic from 1836-1845. The last pieces were withdrawn from circulation in Texas after annexation by the United States in 1845. This was the largest and most comprehensive exhibit of money of the Republic of Texas assembled in Houston during modern times. In addition to the paper money, the historical treasures include original manuscript documents from the period of the Texas Revolution and original artifacts taken from Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, the Mexican President who was captured following the Battle of San Jacinto. Other artifacts include the Mexican General's silver spurs, his vest, an original signed Mexican military order and a pennant Swallowtail Flag which was captured after the victory at San Jacinto.

This also gave the TNA members in Houston a chance to talk with other historians about National

Coin Week and the important historical record that can be traced through our coin and paper money collections. For the university professors and museum representatives, it gave them a different perspective into the joys of exploring history through numismatics. I would like to thank my fellow Houstonians Ed Stephens, Michael Doyle, Richard Laster and


Darrel Brown for loaning their items for the display. We received numerous compliments regarding the depth and beauty of the material. The entire event was fun,







ere is the news from local coin clubs around the state. We have edited the reports from the clubs to include mainly program presentations and have put information about upcoming club coin shows in the calendar section.

There were a number of interesting examples of these tokens including some bearing some rather pointed political statements.

San Angelo Coin Club

April Meeting - The April meeting for the San Angelo Coin Club began at the West Texas Collections, Angelo State University. We were there to view a complete coin and paper collection of the Mexican Revolutionary War (1910-1917) recently donated to the university. It was a turbulent period in Mexico. Diaz, Madero, Carranza, Huerta, Francisco Arango Dorantes (Pancho Villa), Obregon, Zapata, and Alvarado were all vying for the presidency. Between 1913 and 1920 Mexico had 10 Presidents, one of whom occupied the office for 46 minutes. We saw some very crude cast copies of government issue coins. Some made from railroad car metal and the 2 centavos from copper obtained from the trolley wires. Other coins, since the rebels had no means of refining the ore, contain a good amount of gold. For example, the 1914 silver dos pesos of Pancho Villa has .595 gm. Oro (gold).

Our members then went to Pepe's Restaurant where President Franklin Mann called the meeting to order with 21 members and 1 guest present.

Tom gave the financial report. He also showed the membership a copy of the new TNA News where a very interesting article about coins of the Mexican Revolution. While at the West Texas Collections we saw the opportunity to use their facilities to setup a coin display that should create interest in numismatics. Permission was obtained and arrangements will be made for our Club to show some of the membership coins this summer.

DISTRICT FIVE Dallas Coin Club

March Meeting - There were 18 Members in attendance as well as 3 Guests. We were delighted to see Brule Carleson, a Dallas Coin Club Member since 1974, at the meeting. Show & Tell-Several members brought items to share with the club.

March Program by Ron Blaha - "Civil War Tokens- The Patriotics" Ron began the program with an overview of Civil War Tokens. There were two types of Civil War Tokens- patriotic and store cards. The patriotic tokens generally had a patriotic slogan or design on one side. Store cards typically used a somewhat generic design on one side- an Indian or eagle, etc. on one side and the other side generally contained the merchant's name and details about their business and their address. Since merchants generally used an existing die, they were able to save money on the token production since only one die needed to be engraved. There were also sutler tokens which are much rarer and therefore are generally very costly. Sutlers were merchants who followed the troops and sold goods to the soldiers (essentially a traveling version of a modern PX- post exchange). The tokens were generally the size of a small cent and were frequently made primarily of copper. However, many other metals were used. CWTs (Civil War Tokens) appeared first in Cincinnati in late 1862 and were issued until 1864. It is believed that approximately 1500 different patriotic varieties were issued and approximately 8500 store card varieties. As with United States large cents and other issues, there were many varieties and there are books that catalog the varieties and provide attribution information. There are no precise production numbers. It is estimated that 25 to 50 million tokens were minted and that perhaps one million still exist today. Many were melted down for their metal, etc. Error tokens are common due to the conditions under which the tokens were produced- clipped planchets, laminations, die cracks, cuds, etc. The most prolific distributor of the tokens was Gustavius Lindenmueller, a bar owner in New York state. He placed over a million of his tokens in circulation in early 1863. However, he eventually refused to redeem a large quantity of the tokens that New York City attempted to exchange. That refusal forced the federal government to take action. On April 22nd and June 8th of 1864, Congress passed laws that forbid their distribution, so holders of the tokens were unable to redeem them. Congress never made it illegal to possess the tokens however

April Meeting - Frank Clark called the meeting to order. There were 14 Members in attendance as well as 1 Guest, George Koehl. Secretary Kathy Lawrence announced that the Club received a letter from the ANA confirming our nomination of Joe Boling for ANA Governor.

Show & Tell- Since many of our Members have collecting

interests outside the area of numismatics, Ron Blaha brought a matching pair of some very interesting early Texas license plates, including one from the first year of issue- 1917. Prior to that time, people made their own licenses- often using leather. The license plates that were issued were good for a few years and then round seals would be attached to the plates extending their use. Ron also brought one of the first seals that St. Louis issued in 1912 that was made of porcelain and an early Missouri license plate. Brule Carleson brought a copy of an article about Victor Toogood's motorcycle shop that appeared in the July 1982 issue of Texas Monthly. Victor Toogood brought a medal from the Golden Anniversary of the Dallas Coin Club in 1978. It was designed by Commander Andrews and part of the design included Thanksgiving Square.

April 2007 Program by Ron Blaha- "Civil War Tokens- The Store Cards" Ron presented slides that originally belonged to Commander Andrews of Civil War Store Card tokens. Images that appeared on the tokens that were issued by merchants included stoves, safes, hats, a dog with "Good for a Scent", boots, etc. A variety of different types of businesses were represented including newspapers, grocers, liquor and/or wine sellers, sellers of building supplies, butchers, and hardware stores.

Various slogans appeared on some of the tokens (Patriotics and Store Cards), including "Money Makes the Mare Go" along with "Go It Buttons", "Time Is Money" and "Live and Let Live".

Kathy Lawrence provided information concerning the Fuld numbering system for Civil War Store Card tokens. The number begins with the two-letter state abbreviation, followed by the three digit number representing the specific city within that state and is then followed by additional numbers indicating the token number for that merchant and the type of metal used for the token.

Kathy also brought a copy of the Civil War Token Society Journal and copies of some of the Civil War token reference books and mentioned their prices and the discounts that can be received through membership in the Civil War Token Society.

DISTRICT SIX

Bellaire Coin Club

March Meetings - March 3 - There were 23 members and guests at the meeting. Jim Bevill and Sebastian Frommhold presented the board elections. Greater Houston Coin Club

March Meeting - Richard Laster called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m. There were 38 attendees including guests.

Show & Tell: Many interesting items were shown by several members. Sebastian introduced our scheduled speaker, Brian Holland to speak on 'The Early Coins of England". We soon learned that Brian meant really early (before the Norman invasion of 1066 AD). The talk was illustrated by about a dozen coins from Brian's superb collection, and shown on a large screen courtesy of Bellaire Coin Club's 'viewer'. Brian's tour began with some comments on the earliest coins used in Britain, Roman types including a gold stater (first century B.C, inscribed style, from Northumbria). After the Bodeican Revolt, the Romans left Britain for good in 410 A.D. Brian noted the Anglo-Saxon coins (very small in size) struck for only about a century 680-760. These include the first English Penny (first use of the word penny as well) in Mercia. Use of the Lombardic alphabet makes these hard to make out. Brian continued with the first king of all England (Edgar, who late in his reign introduced crude portrait coinage), and Brian's favorite the "long cross" type penny 997-1003. Aethelred the Second followed up with the 'short cross' penny (still a silver coin). In quick succession, Aethelred had to flee to Normandy, Knut struck four types of silver pennies, Edward the Confessor left no heirs upon his death in January 1066, and William of Normandy claimed the throne. British coinage history after 1066 will be the subject of a future presentation. Brian's grasp of the intersection of British history and numismatics is unparalleled; we are fortunate for his willingness to share.

April Meeting - Richard Laster called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m. There were 44 attendees including guests.

Show & Tell: Several members had interesting items to share during this part of the meeting.

Sebastian introduced our scheduled speaker, Alvin Stern to speak on "Original Surfaces", an important subject to coin and medal collectors. Alvin started his illustrated talk with the 'look' of a newly struck coin, explaining how the reflection of radiating luster and a band of light is created by flow lines created on the surface of the coin at the moment of striking. He used the example of bright white Morgan Dollar and said to note the satiny field. A probing question from the audience led Alvin to a great explanation in answer to: "Is it feasible to get 100+ year old bright white or red coins?" He responded "Yes, they do exist as well-maintained original examples, but many more were not so maintained due to handling packaging heat, humidity, and general lack of care". Trouble is, many of those have later been 'conserved' or cleaned to appear to be bright white or 'red'. Experience can make the difference in being able to unmask these poseurs.

An important part of Alvin's fine talk acknowledged that some coins are not market-acceptable because storage conditions have darkened them. He showed before/after examples of coins that went from unacceptable to quite attractive when briefly dipped in a diluted acid liquid dip and dried without rubbing. Examples included a Peace Dollar and a 1917 type 1 quarter.

After acknowledging that some coins cannot be healed (particularly copper or bronze), Alvin gave useful advice on storing coins -- avoid PVC holders, and keep coins in all kinds of holders from heat and humidity. His watchword was: Competent Holders

Pasadena Coin Club

March Meetings - March 8th - There were 27 members and one visitor for dinner and the meeting. Roundtable: Willard R. began with a large Jefferson, 3rd President medal. He facetiously introduced it as either an early release of the 3rd Presidential Dollar coin or a large paperweight. Fernando R. had a 1945 gold Mexico 50 Peso, containing 1.2057 ounces of gold, which was his first major gold coin. The beauty of the Winged Liberty design compares favorably with the U.S. \$20 St. Gauden and 50¢ Walking Liberty designs. Glen Z. had a 2006 Proof \$5 from the Cook Islands, a .925 silver square coin featuring Pope Benedict XVI. It has a cross made of Swarovski Crystal. They fit a "square Peg" into a "round hole" by placing the square coin in a round plastic capsule. Paul C. had a stock certificate for the Apex **Texas Pagentings** Check Hinge Corporation - the hinge is for attaching toilet seats! The unissued certificate is No. 72 in a 1925 issue of 10,000 shares at \$10 per share. Bill H. showed a ribboned medal celebrating the Centennial of the founding of New Braunfels, 1845-1945. He found it at an estate sale. The celebration was May 10, 11, 12, 1946, after WWII was over. The medal shows a family leading a team of oxen, pulling a Prairie Schooner.

Program: Fernando R gave a presentation about the origins of the Dollar Symbol. He gave out printed copies of the program.

March 22nd - There were 31 present, including 2 adult and 2 junior visitors for dinner and the meeting. Fernando R. presided in the absence of our traveling President. Roundtable: Fernando R. began with a set of silver fork, spoon and tongs made from coins bearing Arabic lettering. The intricate lace-like patterns also indicated their source. Paul C. had a paper 15 Sols Assignat from the French Revolution, 1789-1794. As in most revolutions metal was hoarded, and paper money had to be printed. This was from Series 1407, dated 1793, issued in 1794, so there were many notes printed! This was the 2nd year of the First Republic. The Monarchy was abolished in 1793. The decimal system was adopted in 1794. 15 Sols was approximately \$2.00.Larry A. had an 1985 German one ounce silver medal celebrating the 2000th Anniversary of the city of Augsburg in Bavaria, founded under the reign of Augustus Cæsar. Fred B. had a 1993 sterling silver Vatican medal showing Michelangelo's THE ORIGINAL SIN AND EXPULSION FROM EDEN. The reverse depicted an interior view of the Sistine Chapel, where the original painting is located. Py C. had a Mexico 5 New Pesos from the 12 coin Endangered Wildlife Series, 2000-2001. This one depicts the Jaguar. All are 50,000 mintage except the first, Pacific Ridley Turtle. Bill S. had a Mexico 1877 50 centavos, Guanajuato Mint, in VG condition. He says the rarity of this coin, particularly when considering melts, should make it worth much more that it's \$10 cost. Art S. showed a New York Mint catalog, offering coins at 3 times what local dealers are charging (without the slick catalog!)

New Coin Club Started in San Antonio. Fernando R. began a coin club for collectors of coins from Mexico. Editors note: see full story on page 8 of this issue.

Gateway Coin Club

March Meetings - Mar. 1 – The first meeting of the month opened at 7:00 p.m. with 19 members and 4 visitors present.

The roundtable discussion was led by David Astwood, who had an attractive 1890 silver crown from Great Britain. Frank Galindo brought a distinctive religious medal from Germany depicting St. John the Evangelist. The medal was issued in Essen in 1975 and is made of zinc. Don Knapp had a coin with a shining star stuck on the obverse. Karla Galindo showed three items: a 2007 Rey Feo Fiesta medal, a Charms Candy token featuring President Herbert Hoover, and a 1934 Chrysler 10th anniversary token. Bill Davis brought three items: a 10th anniversary TNA medal, a Sesquicentennial Indiana medal, and a Dodge City, Kansas' China Doll brothel token. Art Snider had a striking Canadian 150th commemorative piece of the first postage stamp issued in Canada. Larry Foster showed an impressive Hurricane Katrina first anniversary medal.

Mar. 15 – The meeting opened with 27 members and 1 visitor in attendance. The roundtable was opened by Fernando Razo who showed an early silver Mexican un peso depicting Emperor Maximillian. Joseph Stolowski had three novelty currency notes: a .99 cents, a \$3.00, and a \$4.00. Tom Bailey brought a 1919 Notegeld emergency money note and a Charles Shreiner bank token dated 1869-1969. Bill Davis showed an old interesting copper coin he found in a junk box. According to Bill, his coin resembles a U.S. colonial piece from Connecticut similar to one shown in the Red Book. Sherry Houwerzyl brought 2006 and 2007 Fiesta medals. David Astwood had a striking silver medal commemorating the Texas Ranger Sesquicentennial. The obverse had 2 Texas Rangers mounted on horseback. The reverse featured the Texas Lone Star.

April Meetings - Apr. 5 - There were 28 members and 2 visitors present. This meeting was prior to Easter Sunday and our tables were beautifully decorated with colorful Easter baskets and plastic eggs that contained uncirculated coins, tokens, and candy.

Spain held the Philippines for over 300 years. Commodore Dewey defeated the Spanish Navy in Manila Bay. In 1899 the Philippine-American War started and went on through 1913. In 1935 the Philippines became an American Commonwealth. The U.S. was going to let the Philippines have their own independence in the 1930s but the war put a stop to that. Tony said that he bought an old globe with Philippine independence written on it. Philippine-Spanish coins from 1864 through 1887 are available, and were circulated for many years. The U.S. Mint produced Philippine coins from 1903 through 1945. In 1903 the Peso contained .900 fine silver. In 1907 this was reduced to .800 fine silver. The 10 and 20 Centavos were .750 fine silver. The coins were minted in the San Francisco mint, the Denver Mint and the Manila Mint which had an "M" mint mark. The "S" mint mark coins are listed in the Red Book. Approximately 15 million coins were dumped into the Manila Bay when Japan captured the Philippines. Ferdinand Marcos had his own salvage operation in the bay to salvage the coins. An additional find was a Golden Buddha. After World War II McArthur coins were minted for circulation in the Philippines.

March Meeting - The meeting was called to order with 13 Members. Rob Robinson announced that plated coins maybe in our future. He said that Canada makes coins out of steel and plates over them. Canada recalled all of the older coins with dates before 2000. Rob Robinson told a story about an estate sale with a brass telescope that he bought for \$300 and sold for \$1,500.
