The American Numismatic Association is asking its members to provide the theme for 2008 National Coin Week, April 20-26. This contest is open to all ANA members, with the winning theme announced in early December. Individuals who submit the top three themes will win beautiful and valuable coins. Specific prizes will be announced in mid-November.

Soon after arriving at the show, I was directed to the table of dealer, Bill Yates. Bill was all smiles. Seems that he had just joined the ranks as one of a select few to get Jim Waite to part with some cash. Jim is a member of several local clubs and works with Mike Grant at his store in Arlington and at coin shows. Anyone meeting Jim has found themselves enjoying his quick wit and friendly disposition. FRAUDULENT PRESIDENTIAL \$1 ERROR COINS BEING SOLD

The United States Mint has recently learned that some individuals are grinding the rims of Presidential \$1 Coins to remove the edge-incused inscriptions and then marketing these altered items as error coins. This practice not only exploits unwary consumers and collectors, but also is a Federal crime.

The United States Mint recently announced that an undetermined number of George Washington Presidential \$1 Coins were minted and issued without the required edge-incused inscriptions, "E Pluribus Unum," "In God We Trust," the year of issuance, and the mint mark. Because true error coins such as these can be rare, they often become very attractive among collectors, many of whom are willing to acquire them at a premium above their face value. Apparently, some individuals are exploiting this situation by altering the rims of perfectly good Presidential \$1 Coins to make them look like the recent error coins.

Although altering and defacing United States coinage generally is not illegal, doing so violates a Federal criminal statute (18 U.S.C. § 331) when the act is accompanied by an intent to defraud. Accordingly, a person is committing a Federal crime if he or she


that one knows has been altered so it looks like an error coin to someone who believes it to be a real error coin. Penalties include a fine and up to five years in prison.

The United States Mint has no Federal enforcement authority. Rather, it refers such matters to the United States Secret Service, which is lawfully authorized to detect and arrest any person who violates a Federal law relating to United States coinage.

Presidential \$1 Coins With "Upside-Down" Edge-Lettering Are Not Errors

It has come to the attention of the United States Mint that some people are offering to sell so-called George Washington Presidential \$1 "error" coins with "upside-down" edge-lettering on on-line auction sites. These coins are not "error" coins. The Presidential \$1 Coins are inscribed on the edge without regard to their "heads" or "tails" orientation.

The edge-incused inscriptions on Presidential \$1 Coins are the year of minting or issuance, "E Pluribus Unum," "In God We Trust" and the mint mark. The United States Mint incuses these inscriptions on the edge of each coin at the second step of a two-step coining process. In the first step, the blanks are fed into a coining machine which impresses the obverse and reverse designs onto the coins, and dispenses the coins into a large bin. In the second step, the bin is transported to the edge-incusing machine, into which the coins are fed at random, without regard to their "heads" or "tails" orientation. Therefore, statistically, approximately one-half of the coins produced will have edge-lettering oriented toward the "heads" side (obverse), and approximately one-half of the coins will have the edge-incused inscriptions oriented toward the "tails" side (reverse). Thanksgiving-Related Themes on a Variety of Numismatic Items _____

Images pertaining to the Pilgrims have appeared on many numismatic-related items over the years.

The harvest feast that was shared by the Plymouth colonists and the Wampanoag Indians in 1621 became known as the first Thanksgiving. Before landing in Plymouth, the colonists first landed in what became Provincetown, Massachusetts in November 1620 and explored the Cape Cod area for five weeks. They had been blown off course due

to bad weather. The Pilgrim Monument in Provincetown, Massachusetts was completed in 1910 to commemorate that first landing of the Mayflower in the New World. Elongated cent collectors may have an EC of the Pilgrim Monument.



The Continental Congress issued a proclamation on October 11, 1782 in Philadelphia that Thanksgiving was to be celebrated on November 28th of that year. In 1863, Presi-



dent Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation making Thanksgiving a national holiday, a tradition which continues to this day.

Over the years, Thanksgiving-related themes have appeared on United States coins, paper money, tokens and other numismaticrelated items.

Civil War token collectors may consider several of the tokens issued in the 1860's during the war as having Thanksgiving-related themes. In fact, one of the rarer patriotic tokens is known as "The Pilgrim".

Many have disagreed with that label and Bob French recently presented some of those arguments in his article "Civil War Pilgrim" in the Spring 2007 issue of The Civil War Token Journal. Among the arguments, the person portrayed is dressed more like a sol-

dier and Western explorer than a Pilgrim and some believe it is a representation of John C. Fremont.

Collectors of the store card variety of Civil War tokens might consider the Washington Market token as containing Thanksgiving





themes. A turkey is portrayed on the obverse and the reverse contains vegetables and is one of the Civil War tokens with a pacifist slogan. In this case, the phrase is "Live and Let Live".

From 1920-1921, a U.S. Commemorative half dollar was issued to celebrate the Pilgrim Tercentenary- the three hundredth anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims in the New World. The portrait on the obverse depicts Governor William Bradford carrying a Bible under his left arm. The Mayflower is represented on the reverse.

Collectors of So-Called Dollars (medals that were generally struck to commemorate an event and may be struck in silver, bronze, brass, aluminum, white metal, etc.) may be familiar with the 1870 Pilgrim Jubilee Memorial in Plymouth, Massachusetts. It commemorated the 250th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims. There are at least three different varieties- brass, copper and silver-plated.



Many tokens and medals have been produced pertaining to Thanksgiving.

The reverse of the medal shown below includes a quote from Gov. Bradford based on the events of November 1621, "they began now to gather in the small harvest they had, and to come in store of waterfowl and venison... thus they found the Lord to be with them in all their ways, for which His Holy Name have praise forever."





Several series of U.S. notes contain engravings of the Pilgrims, including:

\$50 National Bank Notes, First Charter Period, Series 1875, with "Embarkation of the Pilgrims" based on a mural by Robert Walter Weir (Fr. 440-451). The scene depicted is that of the Pilgrims about the sail to the New World in search of religious freedom and it took place on July 22, 1620 at Delft Haven, Holland Mr. Weir's work will be mentioned elsewhere in this article as well.

\$5 National Bank Notes, Third Charter Period, First Issue, Series of 1902 (Red Seal) with an engraving of the "Landing of the Pilgrims" on the back (Fr. 587-612).

\$5 Federal Reserve Bank Notes, Series 1915 and 1918 with "Columbus in Sight of Land" engraved by Joseph Ourdan based on Charles Schussle's painting on the left side of the back. The "Landing of the Pilgrims" engraved by G.F.C. Smillie is on the right side (Fr. 781-809a).





\$5 Federal Reserve Bank Notes, Series 1914 (Red Seals and Blue Seals) with "Columbus in Sight of Land" engraved by Joseph Ourdan

based on Charles Schussle's painting on the left side of the back. The "Landing of the Pilgrims" engraved by G.F.C. Smillie is on the right side (Fr. 832A-891C).

\$10,000 Federal Reserve Note, Series of 1918, with Weir's "The Embarkation of the Pilgrims" (Fr. 1135).

Beautiful engravings of Pilgrim scenes have appeared on several souvenir cards. The International Plate Printers, Die Stampers and Engravers Union of North America issued a marvelous souvenir card in 1981 with a Bureau of Engraving and Printing engraving from the early 1860's that was to



appear on the \$2, but was never used. The engraving is based on "The Embarkation of the Pilgrims, 1620" by Robert W. Weir.

The souvenir card by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing for the International Paper Money Show, Memphis, Tennessee 1992 with an engraving of "The Historic Voyage" is also a work of art.

The Col. Steven Ellsworth Collection of U.S. Half Cents to be Offered in Heritage's May 2008 Long Beach Signature Auction

Dallas, TX. A magnificent collection of early American half cents, assembled by long-time collector and dealer Col. Steven Ellsworth, will be offered at public auction by Heritage Auction Galleries at the official auction of the Long Beach Coin Expo, May 28-31. Highlights from the Col. Ellsworth's collection will be exhibited by Heritage at the FUN 2008 and February 2008 Long Beach conventions.

"One of the most appreciated aspects of our auction status," noted Heritage President Greg Rohan, "is when a fellow professional numismatist consigns his personal treasures to our auctions. When a dealer with decades of experience selling coins comes to Heritage because he knows that we will achieve the highest prices possible in the marketplace, he is complimenting both our marketing skills and the voracious numismatic appetites of our clients."

Col. Ellsworth's interest in coins started at a very young age:

"I can remember as a six-year old gathering soda pop bottles from the fields and roads. I would pull my red Radio Flyer wagon behind me, picking up the bottles like potential nuggets of gold. I would then take them to the corner grocery store to redeem them for change. I would then go through the change searching for any years of old coins that I did not yet have."

"At the age of 11," added Rohan, "Col. Ellsworth had placed more than a hundred pounds of coins into an enormous piggy-bank, which was broken open at his local bank as a publicity event. From such a curious beginning came this marvelous collection!"

Col. Ellsworth continued to pursue rare coins as an adult, widening his search to auctions, coins shows, and dealers' shops. In 1994, nearing retirement after his overseas service, Col. Ellsworth decided to fill his time by conducting tours of Civil War battlefields during the week, and acting as a 'vest-pocket' dealer on weekends. His coin company name, "Butternut," came from the color of Confederate uniforms after months of use. With his talent, his coin work soon became full time.

Continued Ellsworth:

"After deciding that early American copper coins offered the most challenge, and yet were still available, I began to direct most of my efforts toward collecting American colonial coins, half cents, and large cents. With that decision made, I simply sold nearly all my other coins and put the finds into superlative early copper pieces as I found them. I also realized that being a full-time professional numismatist offered me, at the same time, an opportunity to invest in myself by assembling a personal collection of early copper. And over the years, I helped many clients assemble important collections by focusing on acquisition, liquidity, and storage factors."

Col. Ellsworth wishes "happy hunting, whether you are a collector, dealer, or collector" who becomes the new owner of these numismatic treasures. "I hope the education and pure thrill of collecting will be kept alive in all pursuits of these early American numismatic masterpieces. Be sure to take time to enjoy the hunt, and make as many friends as possible along the way."

For the collectors, the TNA and the member coin clubs around the state offer you a way to learn about this very interesting and diverse history of the money through a variety of educational activities and programs. Whether your specialty is Morgan dollars, U.S type, paper money, foreign coins or ancients, all of us can learn from each other.

As an educational organization, we must look forward to the next generation if we plan to pass down this accumulated base of knowledge. As is mentioned elsewhere in this publication, the TNA Youth Auction which was held in Waco last month was not only well attended but well received in the community. 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
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Launch Coin" which came with a reservation of the Super Mario Galaxy game for the

Wii gaming system.



November 17, 2007 TNA BOARD MEETING REPORT

Hal Cherry, Secretary

The TNA Board met on November 17, 2007 in Waco, Texas in conjunction with the Fall TNA Show there. The meeting was chaired by President Jim Bevill. Other Board Members in attendance included: First VP Joe Olson, Secretary Hal Cherry, Treasurer, Ray Leggett, and Governors Russell Prinzinger, Ed Stephens, Patrick Curran, Doug Hershey, Barbara Williams and Paul Garner. Also attending were Editor Ron Kersey, Youth Chair Kathy Lawrence and ANA Rep Jerry Williams.

Reading of the Minutes of the prior Board Meeting was waived and they were approved as published. Secretary Cherry reported that TNA membership as of November 1, 2007 was 658, an increase of 16 over this date last year. Treasurer Leggett reported cash assets as of November 1, 2007 of \$125,054.40 and that expenditures exceeded receipts by \$3,887.18 for the current fiscal year to date.



President Bevill reported on several topics. The anticipated revenue from the Fall Waco Show would be around \$1,600.00. The February 2008 Show in Houston is on course with 58 out of 65 tables sold. The May 2008 TNA Show in Fort Worth is also on course with 120 tables sold. Part of the McFadden donation included mineral rights and in August the TNA had received \$4,031.50 for a three year lease. The TNA's exhibit of "Money of the Republic of Texas" scheduled to be exhibited at the Alamo is still awaiting completion of fund raising and renovation of facilities at the Alamo. The Board passed a resolution to "confirm the TNA's commitment for our exhibit on the 'Money of the Republic of Texas' at the Alamo and to continue to support the Daughters of the Republic of Texas in their fund raising efforts".

Jerry Williams mentioned by name and thanked the approximately 15 individuals and organizations who had donated either cash or numismatic items to the TNA, primarily the youth activities. Kathy Lawrence reported on the TNA Junior Members Newsletter. It was announced that Coins for A's Chair Jim Hedges would be leaving this position next May. There were discussions on the TNA's involvement as a Host Club for the 2010 ANA Show to be held in Fort Worth and the TNA's 50th Anniversary Convention also in 2010.

The Board voted to increase TNA membership dues to \$20 for Regular and Chapter members and \$8 for Associate members effective for 2008. Other dues will remain the same. This increase is necessary due to the increased costs in printing and mailing the TNA News.

This reports covers highlights of the Board Meeting and does not reflect the entire contents of the official Minutes.



Educational Program Notes - "Multigenerational Planning for Your Collection: The Numismatic Family Meeting" by Steve Roach. Steve led an informal question and answer session that included the following topics:

Estate planning for a collection; Keeping records for tax purposes; The importance of keeping a current inventory, ways to keep it, and how often it should be updated; How coins are graded at major grading services; How to handle large collections of coins

Steve stressed the importance of a family meeting and made several suggestions for planning for the meeting. The meeting should include information on the holdings in the collection, but there are many additional subjects that need to be considered and evaluated as well.

The subjects include whether the collection should remain as a cohesive unit or whether it may be broken apart; whether part or all of the collection will be donated to a museum, etc.; whether each heir should receive an equal portion and how that is to be determined; an evaluation as to whether the heirs are able to properly manage and care for items in the collection; and whether the heirs know how to handle the sale of items.

Although the process may be difficult, the family meeting is an important means of letting your family members know your intentions. It also provides them the opportunity to ask questions.

In some cases, it may become apparent that it would be better for you to dispose of your collection during your lifetime- for the optimum results for your family monetarily and also to ensure that the coins will be properly cared for and will be around for future generations of collectors.

Many of those in attendance raved about the fantastic program that Steve gave and remarked that they learned a lot.

Northeast Tarrant Coin Club

Mike Grant read a letter that he received from Member Kyle Redd. Kyle had asked that Mike share the letter with the Club. Kyle has been spending time in Yellowstone and the surrounding area. He visited the Buffalo Bill Museum in Cody, Wyoming on September 5th and saw several numismatic-related items, including an 1882 Morgan dollar that was used as part of Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show. Buffalo Bill's nephew would toss the coin up into the air and Buffalo Bill would shoot the coin. The dollar was badly bent and had a bullet hole through it. Kyle also saw a \$10 National Bank Note that was drawn on a Cody bank and he thought of Frank Clark when he saw it. There was a little damage to the note, but was otherwise fine. Hal Cherry told a story about when Buffalo Bill would ride his horse by the stands and people in the crowd (including Hal J) would throw glass balls up into the air. Buffalo Bill would shoot the balls with a pistol. However, the pistol was actually bored out like a shotgun, so the wide pellet spread was causing the glass balls to break rather than accurate shooting by Buffalo Bill.

Stewart Huckaby presented the educational program, "Cool Russian Coins". He presented slides of a number of gorgeous high-grade Russian coins that have been sold in recent years by Heritage. All but two of them were in slabs and almost all of them brought significantly more than the estimates. The portraits on the Russian coins that were covered by the program were generally fairly true to life. Almost all of the coins shown were high-grade roubles.

Jim Bevill won the show and tell prize.

Greater Houston Coin Club

October Meeting - The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by the president, Richard Laster. There were 38 members present, plus guests John Dooley, Ginger Bing, Soi Truong, and Gene McPherson. Mr.Dooley submitted an application for membership.

Show and Tell: 1. Sebastian F. - showed a small silver coin from Riga, Latvia from the mid 1600s and discussed how a minting error on it came about from improperly aligned roller dies. The piece, which is only possible when roller dies are used, is called a saddle strike. 2. Bruce B. - Surprised everyone by talking about a coin and not a book. His coin was a porcelain piece from Germany showing a spade and a bunch of grapes. Superb condition. 3. Barney L.. - Had three error notes of Venezuela, including one printed by the American Bank Note Co. 4. Ed A. - Noted that Krause has introduced a 3 volume set of CDs (\$90) of their Standard Catalogs, One CD covers 1801- 1900 issues; once CD covers 1901- 2000, and the third CD covers 2001- date. They also have online information on the 16th, 17th, and 18th century issues. This is a useful alternate to the 'telephone books'. 5. Claude M. - Related that he had started collecting Peace Dollars several years ago - collects graded sets (VF, EF, etc). He completed the VF set first; the 1934 S is the stopper in high grades. 6. Ricardo DeL. - Passed around and described 4 coins of the Spanish Colonial period, including a 1611/10 one-real piece. He related the gold story of Guadeloupe from 1848 (the year of major loss of territory for Mexico). 7. Edwin J. -Brought a copy of Coin Values in which he appears as in interviewee on coin reproductions. Joe Conessa (usually does Hobo nickels) has done some repros of ancient coins using hand-engraved dies. 8. Carl S.. - (Story only) Using Claude's Peace Dollars, Carl noted some symbolism: The eagle has folded wings (less threatening), and has the olive branches of peace in his right talon, showing a preference for peace. There are the rays of a rising sun, signifying a 'new day'.

Educational Presentation: The program for tonight was "The Empresses of Rome" presented by Gail Brichford. In a well-planned presentation, Gail introduced us to the spouses of the

emperors of Rome from Faustina Senior Texas 2 (appenings AD. He gave a short biographical sketch of each, and illustrated with a coin showing the portrait of the lady. He explained the symbolism on a reverse of a denarius of Julia Domna. It was amazing to the audience how racy, scheming, and violent these women were. The program was well received, and Gail is to be congratulated for his care in selecting sharp, attractive, and well preserved coins in forming his collection.

DISTRICT SEVEN

Alamo Coin Club

September Meetings - September 13th Report: There were 29 attending, including visitor Sierra K. President Bill S. opened the meeting with information gleaned from an auction catalog for the Cohen Sale, 1985: Roundtable: William B. had a WWII Red 1 point ration token, given in change for a meat ration coupon. They were made of plastic impregnated cardboard, red for meat and blue for other food items like sugar. Harold E. had two sterling silver medals issued by Longines Symphonette during the 1970s, one commemorating the Lewis & Clark Expedition, 1804-06, and the other, "Old Ironsides" the U.S. Frigate Constitution which, in the War of 1812 defeated a larger British ship because British cannon balls just bounced off the strong solid oak hull of the frigate. Paul C. closed with a Civil War Store Card, a silver coated brass token advertizing a Providence, R.I., bookseller. Round-table prize winner was Paul C. Door Prize winner: Chery E. as the 15th name drawn. Show Report: Past Chairman, Harold E. reported Civic Center costs had increased a total of \$550, but we still cleared about \$1000, including admissions. The increase for the Rocket Room caused the Children's Auction to go in the red, beyond contributions received during the previous 12 months. Show Chairman Fernando R. thanked all who participated in making the show a success for both dealers and visitors.

September 27th Report: There were 27 present, including two new members. Welcome Michael D. and Rafael M. In Bill S.'s absence, Fernando presided and started the Roundtable: Fernando R. had a brilliant 1940-S Winged Liberty dime, slabbed by PCGS as MS66. It was in an earlier holder without a bar code. Willard R. had an 1843 English Farthing. The last year of issue of this 1/4 penny coin was 1956, and the last half penny was issued in 1984. Don K. had an 1899-O Morgan Dollar with a very visible die crack along the top of UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. Larry A., after the program at the last meeting, found a 2001 star note in circulation. Richard M. brought many error coins which he gave away to members and to the Children's Auction. Harold E. closed with the FIDEM XXX catalog for the current Medals Exhibit at the ANA in Colorado Springs. It features a very unique medal design in which several medals can connect like jigsaw puzzles. Roundtable prize winner was Cliff A.

October Meetings - October 11th Report: There were 33 members present. Bill opened the meeting by having Willard tell of meeting a cousin for the first time, on a plane, in the adjacent seat! They struck up a conversation and discovered they were related! Roundtable: Willard R. began with a medal honoring the 2001 VIP opening of Sea World/San Antonio. It read OTHERS AMUSE - WE AMAZE. Fernando R. had a 1998 1/10 oz. proof platinum American Eagle. Larry A. had a 1999 \$5 star note his brother found in change. He said 3 \$1 star notes were found in change in one month. David F. showed a 1909 SVDB, about 3 1/2

inches in diameter! He also had information and photos of the BEP in Ft. Worth, including plans of the Visitor Center. Cliff A. had a 3 inch 1977 Medallic Art medal saluting the flag, showing 11 historical views, from Columbus' landing (Spanish flag) to placing the US flag on the Moon. Between Ft. McHenry and the Civil War was Davy Crocket at the Alamo! (had flag, but not recognizable). Greg M. had a Mexican Revolutionary Coinage 1913-1917, book published by Superior Stamp & Coin Co. David A. had a Yosemite National Park souvenir with D & P minted California State Quarters.

October 25th Report: There were 29 present at the meeting including new member Cecil J. Give him a big welcome! Bill S. opened the meeting with comments from a Swedish Coin Auction catalog about Cooper Chips. Roundtable: Fred B. had a coin received while in Khartoun, Sudan, but it is not shown in World Coins. The denomination is 20, and the device shows a tractor type tire, wheat grain and other produce. Jean B. had a coin from the salvage of the Admiral Gardner, wrecked during a storm in the English Channel in 1809, almost 200 years ago. It was loaded with coins going to the East Indies. Clinton B. had a 2007 Canadian quarter promoting the 2010 Winter Olympics. David A. had a Mexico 2006 bimetallic silver coin, one of the state series, of Chihuahua, showing an angel and a monument. William B. had a promotion card from Louis Ruckhizer (financial adviser) hold ing a Dwight Eisenhower Dollar, dated 1776-1976. Larry A. closed with an 1817 Capped Bust Half Dollar, which is his first for this type. Roundtable prize winner: Fred B.

In 1935 Mr. Schnelling requested a patent on his coin board and received one. Mr. Schnelling's coin boards had cellophane on one side to keep the coins in the holder and allow you to see both sides of the coins. Stacks Auction House surpassed Mr. Schnelling in sales and then Mr. Schnelling joined the Army. The Schnelling board introduced better graphics and had a small grading scale. Mr. Schnelling also produced a ringed binder for coins. He produced penny, nickel and dime boards also. Mr. Schnelling didn't print out mintage numbers on his boards. Robby said that coins on e-bay interest him. He said that he helped a lady with an 1808 one half cent coin and told her what it was worth about. Jerry Crawford said that when you buy coins on e-bay be sure to check the seller feedback data, if they are good it should say so. Tom Ashley said that he has done a lot of business on e-bay. Tony Zubkas said that some sellers sell coins at a lower price because e-bay charges a fee on the price and then they add a large shipping charge because e-bay doesn't add a fee for the shipping charges

October Meeting - There were 12 Members present for the meeting, and two guests Mr. Jim Deatheridge and Mr. Cody Ribble who both joined the club.

Program: Tony Zubkas presented a program about the coins of Australia. He said that Australia produced coins during the era from 1910 to 1964 when they were on the pence and pound system.

He provided some facts about Australia, such as it being the smallest continent, it is 11 larger than Texas, and has a population of 21 million people. He said that a former student of his was stationed in Australia and traveled on one hundred miles of unpaved roads before reaching his radar base where he was stationed. Tony said that humans have inhabited Australia for about 42,000 years. He said that the first European to see Australia was Magellan in 1588. The Dutch landed on Australia in 1606 and Capt. James Cook claimed it for England in1770. Capt Cook explored the eastern coast and claimed it for England. Australia became a penal colony in 1901, and became a Common Wealth. In 1910 it began minting coins. A Gold Sovereign was about one quarter of an ounce of gold. Australia had mints in Melbourne, Perth, and Sidney and farmed out some mintage to other parts of the empire in Bombay and Calcutta India, and London and Heaton in England. Silver coins were minted in the Denver and San Francisco Mints in the USA during World War II. He said that the Royal Australian Mint is now located in Canberra. He said that Queen Elizabeth passed away in 1901 and wasn't on Common Wealth coins. He said that colonial mints produced gold coins, and various merchant tokens were minted after that. Tony said that Pound Sterling coins had seven denominations. He said that the Crown was only issued in Australia for two years. He pointed out that the British Empire had different amounts of silver in their coins throughout the empire and Australia had a higher silver content in their coins than many other mintages in the United Kingdom. He said that albums are available from Whitman and Dansco. He said that the 1938 through 1963 shillings had rams on them even though rams were not native to Australia but represented one of their largest industries. Tony said that the 1927 Florin is his favorite Australian coin as it is different than the rest of the coins. He said that various monarchs were on the face of the coins including Queen Elizabeth from 1953 to 1964. He said that no coins were minted in 1965 by Australia. He pointed out that the profile of the monarchs head is switched when a new monarch take the throne.
