These winners reside all over the state, and this was one of the most geographically diverse group of winners in recent memory. This is a tip of the hat to all the governors and clubs that distributed the opportunity of a raffle ticket to so many.

Judy and Gary Dobbins again hosted the exhibit and judging of said material with a great deal of professionalism. These exhibits were the most diverse and largest assembly exhibitions that the TNA has had in a long time. On Saturday, the honorable Ralph Ross, American Numismatic Association President, presented John Post, long-time TNA Convention Coordinator with an ANA Presidential Service Award. John Post is retiring from his position after a long and distinguished career that encompassed most of the TNA operations. He once acted as judge of one of my TNA exhibits a few years back.

On Saturday, at the open meeting of the TNA membership, awards were presented to many deserving individuals. Gary Dobbins received the Joe Olson award, Bill Welsh received the VIP Award, The Lewis Regan Award was given to Doug Hershey, and the Governor of the Year Award went to Judy Dobbins.

As you may know, the Arlington Convention Center is closing and we had to make a decision to book a new 2024 site. After a deep discussion with your governors and officers and a vote, we made two choices. First, an immediate 2024 interim (one time only) site and an expected long-term site for proposed future conventions. The decision was made to move to the Lone Star Convention center in Conroe, Texas for 2024. The dates of that convention are to be June 28-29-30, 2024. It is a nice facility. The Greater Houston Coin Club for the Houston Money Show has been very successful at the site, with about 2,400 patrons and guests at their 2023 show this past January. Let us hope the TNA is equally successful there.

The Board of Governors, who determine a lot of the things we do as an organization, have been installed for the next two years with a few new and some not so new faces. Please, if you need something, contact your governor to get your concerns addressed (see page 42 for contact information).



This is quite a feat considering historical events, weather events, and even a fire which destroyed a meeting location. At the beginning of Covid, the organization met at a local park until Zoom meetings could be planned. The DCC is looking forward to its Centennial Celebration in another five years. Current members range from novices to professional numismatists. As in the early years of the organization, several members hold offices and appointed positions in the TNA and volunteer with the ANA and Society of Paper Money Collectors.

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
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CLUB SPOTLIGHT: EL PASO

Borderland Show Busts at Seams

Numismatics have been moving strong in the El Paso, Texas borderland region. This was very evident as the International Coin Club of El Paso, Inc. held its 59th Annual El Paso Coin Show 2023 on February 24-26. While hosting this show, the ICCOEP celebrated three major milestones: 1) the City of El Paso, Texas 150-year anniversary, 2) International Coin Club of El Paso, Inc.'s 60th Anniversary, and 3) the 59th Annual El Paso Coin Show. Among the present, dealers from all over the United States (and even Mexico) were selling gold & silver bullion, medals, tokens, casino chips, U.S. and Foreign paper money, scrip and just about anything else one could put under the umbrella of numismatics.

On display to accompany educational exhibits, the International Coin Club of El Paso, Inc. showcased a Proclamation from El Paso City Mayor Oscar Lesser and a Resolution from El Paso County Judge Ricardo Samaniego declaring the week of the El Paso Coin Show as "Numismatism Week".

As the ICCOEP has commissioned a medal annually since 2006, this year was no different. The 2023 medal celebrated 150 years of the Original Incorporation of the City of El Paso, TX. The imagery on the medal featured a historically accurate image of Pioneer plaza from the 1870's (once the center of the town). This is where public notices and news of the day were posted on trees in this plaza. It is widely thought that such news as the Incorporation

of the City of El Paso would have been posted on these newspaper trees. The 2023 medal is struck by the Highland Mint.

On Friday, unbeknownst to club members and show dealers, YouTube celebrity Silver Bean Counter made a surprise visit. He filmed and posted a video to his channel highlighting the El Paso Show. You can watch this video at YouTube on his channel "Silver Bean Counter". The video is titled "Spot Price Of Gold & Silver Tumble Again! Great Time To Buy Bullion At The Coin Show!"

The International Coin Club of El Paso, Inc. was also very happy to be visited by El Paso local celebrity social media influencer Annie from "Annie's Adventures". She toured the show on Friday, Saturday and Sunday posting videos to her social media accounts sharing all the great aspects of the coin collecting hobby. You can follow her at "Annie's Adventures" on Facebook, Instagram, SnapChat and several other social media platforms.

Saturday patrons were welcomed by a surprise Mariachi performance by "Mariachi Frontera". President Jason Elwell set up the surprise and stated that "You can't have a borderland celebration without mariachi's". Patrons and dealers across the bourse floor filmed and enjoyed the show.



One dealer, Larry Cundari of San Antonio, was so impressed with the musical performance that he gave an extra tip to the performers. As the International Coin Club of El Paso, Inc. hosts dealers from across the country; seeing a live mariachi band was a first-time experience for many of them.

Fan favorite Walt Ostromecki, former President of the American Numismatic Association, was in attendance doing what Walt does best, educating youth about coins and showcasing his "Youth Coin Trivia Treasure Hunt". This program is always a favorite among the children and parents. Walt stated that "the El Paso Show and youth participation was so great, there was a need for more trivia prizes". Dealers were happy to fulfill this supply shortage through coin donations.

Like clockwork, the Coin Auction for Children commenced at 2 p.m. by Life Members Steve Phillips and Willie Terrazas. They were amazed on how many children showed up at the event. The need for chairs was so great, more chairs were brought twice. This full house created a fun filled packed auction and made bidding fun and competitive amongst the kids. Willie Terrazas mentioned "How great it is to see past youth all grown up and now returning with their younger siblings and children." Steve Phillips also mentioned that "The members of the International Coin Club of El Paso really heeded the call in donating some fantastic prizes." Such prizes for the youth were a Spanish Colonial 1 Real, a graded Confederate paper note, and high-grade silver coins. Lastly, as an auction surprise, a brand new laptop was given to a lucky child by drawing.

Dealers were very happy with the traffic at the El Paso Coin Show. Many stated that the El Paso show was the best show they had had in a long time. To give an idea as to the numbers of people present, all 600 giveaway counters were gone by midday Saturday. This includes the 50 lke clad dollars that were given to the first 50 people on Saturday morning. A final patron count total for the show is unknown as all counters were given, but club volunteers were happy to report such a turnout. Unfortunately, the weather turned sour on Sunday and the coin show was cut short. Even with the weather hiccup on Sunday, the 59th Annual El Paso Coin Show 2023 will go down as one memorable show. ICCOEP President Jason Elwell would like to thank all dealers, volunteers, and club members that made this show a success.

The Coinage of Lundy

Lundy is an English island in the Bristol Channel. It was a micronation from 1925–1969. It forms part of the district

of Torridge in the county of Devon. It's only about 3 miles (5 kilometres) long and 5/8 mi (1 km) wide.



History of lundy

It was first attested as a place name in 1189 in the Records of the Templars in England where it appears as "Insula de Lundeia". The Marisco family took possession of the island from the Knights Templar in the late 1100's. In 1281, it appears in the Charter Rolls as Lunday. [years of piracy, civil war, and intrigue which we won't bother with here.] In 1924, Martin Coles Harman bought the island of Lundy and proclaimed himself a king. In 1929, he issued two coins: ½ puffin and 1 puffin, nominally equivalent to the British 1/2 penny and 1 penny. Mintage was 50,000 pieces each, struck at Ralph Heaton's Mint in Birmingham.











Could he do this???

Great Britain didn't think so. He was prosecuted under the United Kingdom's Coinage Act of 1870, and the House of Lords found him guilty in 1931. He was fined 5 pounds with 15 guineas as expenses. The coins were withdrawn, and they became collector's items.

So what happened next?

Residents did not pay taxes to the United Kingdom and had to pass through customs when they travelled to and from Lundy Island. Although it was ruled as a virtual fiefdom, it never claimed to be independent of the United Kingdom. In 1965, a second issue of coins, made by John Pinches, were struck to commemorate the 40th anniversary of Martin Coles Harman's purchase of Lundy. Coins were struck in bronze, nickel-brass, and gold, with proof finishes. Mintage was 3,000 base metal sets and 25 gold sets.

Lundy – times of transition

Lundy was purchased by Jack Hayward in 1969. He gave it to the National Trust, who leased it to the Landmark Trust. The Landmark Trust has managed the island since then, deriving its income from tourism. But we're not done yet!!!

Lundy – modern times

In 1977, Queen Elizabeth II celebrated her Silver Jubilee, 1952-1977. She actually visited the small island of Lundy as part of her year-long celebration. A souvenir set consisting of a sheet of 6 stamps and ½ puffin and 1 puffin proof copper coins dated 1977 were made available. Only 1,977 sets were issued.





Lundy coins In the 21st century

A 5-coin set was released in 2011 - a Fantasy issue by Joseph E. Lang. As with the original coins, Mr. Harman is depicted on the obverse. The 1/2 Puffin and 1 Puffin coins -copper-plated zincmaintain the same design that the 1929 issues. The brass 2 Puffins depicts two puffins in flight. The brass 4 Puffins depicts four puffins flying around the Old Light House built in 1787. The nickel 6 puffins depicts six puffins in flight above Marisco Castle built around 1238. Mintage was 10,000 sets.

A clip is not a void nor is a void a clip

recently purchased another error coin for my FREAK SHOW 1968 collection. It was a modest purchase, being a slightly clipped nickel that set me back less than an 'L' note, which seemed a good value since it was already slabbed. At the same time, I had also been eyeing a slightly better piece which was triple clipped. While contemplating the dealer's offer, I started thinking more about the term <u>clipped</u>. Having attended an excellent summer seminar class on the modern minting process, I knew neither of these pieces were truly clipped. Actually, if you have read anything regarding the history of milled coins or more the contemporary reeding edge, you would have been acquainted with the origin of the term clipped coins. Even to this day, reeding still exists despite the fact that the justification for reeding did not matter in 1968, but that is a story for another time. So, if not clipped, then what term would better describe and error coin with a piece missing (whether it be straight, curved, or ragged)?

Now, why should we mess with a term that has been around for a very long time? Well, just type in <u>clipped coins</u> using your favorite search engine, and you should see why it may need an update. Typically, what appears first





are examples from medieval times of silver pieces where some unscrupulous individual has quite literally clipped the edge legend off of the piece. The reason these individuals thought they could potentially get away with this is, unlike today, all the circulating silver pieces were not uniform in their appearance. As you probably noticed, I have referred to these as pieces, since they were not exactly coins in the modern sense as they lacked that third side created by the collar that contains the expanding metal when struck by the opposing dies. So, this lack of uniformity led some to take advantage of this situation by clipping off the edge of the coin. It also probably helped that most of the population was illiterate at that time, so how many people could read the legend anyway or had a scale handy to know what the actual weight that their recently received silver piece should be. Penalties, unlike the clipped pieces, were not light. I read of one woman as recently as April 11, 1678 being sentenced to be burnt for being caught with clippings, as it was considered high treason. So, a coin being clipped does not accurately describe what I collect, though it does have a dark side, like my collection.

For those who have not studied how these <u>clipped</u> (just using the current nomenclature for clarity) coins occur, the error starts at the creation of the blank. The blank is created by punching a metal disc out of a sheet of metal of the correct composition and thickness for its intended use in the creation of a planchet, as part of the *blanking* process. To help in understanding the *blanking* (no it is not a derogatory term, but putting it in italics lets the mind wander a bit) process, just think of when you were little and had access to your first hole punch and a sheet of paper. Every time you squeezed



the punch, out popped a perfectly circular paper disc. But then you got crazy, and before you knew it, out popped a half-moon. Well, that was neat. So exactly how did that happen? If you punch one perfect circle and then just punch another slightly offset from the first, boom! Half-moon. You could also punch one between two previous circle punches and get something resembling a bowtie if close together or a circle with a bite out of both sides. You could also move the punch to the edge of your sheet and get something akin to a setting

sun. So, with that example as a visual, you can see neither the half-moon, sunset, or punches with more than one bite out of it were created by removing a piece of material after their creation. So,



the void existed before the planchet was finished, as it occurred at the time of the blank's creation.

The blank, the planchet, or the coin was never clipped, whether straight, curved, or ragged. There was a void that existed at the time the metal disc was punched out of the sheet. So, you could state that the blank was light, because it would weigh less than the standard, but there are already errors in that regard for blanks cut from the wrong thickness of metal or tapered due to the errors in the milling process. So <u>light blank</u> does not work, which draws me to the term I fall back to: void. Still, straight void, curved void, or ragged void - I am not sure that will catch on, as in each instance, you almost need to add the word blank, as planchet would not be



correct. So, what other synonyms can I find for void? In retrospect, I did not find any better, though still join me down the rabbit hole.

The top adjective for my favorite online search engine was empty, but a straight empty just would have people scratching their heads. Another synonym was blank, but as that is what the metal disc is referred to before it becomes a planchet, I quickly ruled it out, along with bare, clear, free, and vacant. Then there were terms like barren and desolate, but that seemed a lot bleaker than what I was looking for in a describing the error. I decided to check the Funk and Wagnalls edition of Webster's New World Thesaurus (I know, that last word has me thinking dinosaur, too, even before opening a book). This new source did provide some more amusing descriptors like meaningless and worthless, still no eureka moment. So, I decided maybe void does best describe the error, as it occurs due to the absence of material at the time of the blank's creation.

With this information in mind, what do you think: straight <u>void</u> or straight <u>clip</u>? I think the former describes the error type more scientifically, but will the community at large and third-party graders agree? I am not so sure. Still, I offer it for your consideration.

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The Commemorative Coin Gap

ommemorative coins have been popular since the days of ancient Greece and Rome. They ✓ are rich in a history that recorded and honored important events, people, places, or institutions. In many cases the coins were issued to help raise money for special organizations or causes. The coins were not intended for general circulation, yet they are still legal tender. During the 1892-1893 Chicago World's Fair, the 400th anniversary of Christopher Columbus' exploration of the New Word was recognized. The organizers of the exposition won approval from Congress to commemorate the event with two specially designed commemorative coins: the Columbian Exposition Half Dollar the and the Queen Isabella Quarter. These coins are considered the first standard commemorative coins in the United States.

Most of the commemorative coins issued from 1915-1954 were silver half dollars. They included coins recognizing the Panama-Pacific Exposition, the Battle of Gettysburg, the Oregon Trail, the Texas Centennial, George Washington Carver, and others. The last commemorative coin issued before the modern era that began in 1982 was the George Washington Carver-Booker T. Washington Half Dollar that was issued from 1951-1954.

Beginning in the 1930's, however, the government began to see that the commemorative program was being overused and abused. Endless mint runs were urged to increase profits for certain groups, as well as altering mintage amounts and mintage locations. To curtail these negative trends, the United States ceased minting commemorative coins from 1955 - 1981. Then in 1982, with Congressional approval, the US Mint launched the modern era of commemorative coinage with the issuance of a George Washington 250th Anniversary Commemorative half dollar. More than seven million of these coins were sold, identifying the coin as very popular with the public and collectors.

Today we can continue to collect modern commemorative coins for their historical and numismatic value as we celebrate and recognize the many people, places and events that shaped our nation's rich history.



Questions for Dr. Coyne

1) Is this item a coin, token, or medal?

This is a token. It is intended to pass for money

– the "denomination" is a half cent. The essential
difference between a coin and a token is that the
coin must be issued by a government, while a token
can be issued by a private entity. Both coins and
tokens are intended to circulate as money, while a
medal is a commemorative and is not intended

to circulate. A medal has no denomination or fixed exchange value.

2) Are there any proof U.S. Large Cents?

The U.S. Mint did not begin regular sales of proof coins to collectors until 1858. But there are scattered small mintages of Large Cents and other coins known for several years, particularly in the 1830's. In early literature these were sometimes called "specimen coins" or "master coins".

3) When was the first Federal Reserve Note issued by the U.S.? What color was the seal?


The earliest Federal Reserve Notes are series 1914 with a red seal and are all scarce. They follow establishment of the Federal Reserve itself in 1913. The earliest FRNs were in the large size and did not have the now-traditional green seal until Series 1928. From Series 1928 (small size) onward until the recent appearance of the "large portraits", the FRN did not have changes that were obvious to the general public. But because there are 12 issuing districts and many signature combinations, collectors today are challenged to assemble complete sets.



4) When did the U.S. make its first non-silver one dollar coin?

Excluding patterns, the first non-silver one dollar coin is the gold dollar of 1849. Gold dollars continued to be issued through 1889. Regular issue Eisenhower Dollars in copper-nickel clad on pure copper began in 1971. Homogeneous alloy manganese brass Sacagawea Dollars began in 2000. The last silver dollar for circulation was the 1935 Peace Dollar.





We can distinguish the 1917 quarter from the similar (and much more valuable) 1916 issue by a difference in the shape of the bottom of the dress on the left edge of the sculpt near liberty's foot. On the 1917 issue, this outline is almost semi-circular, while on the 1916 coins, the lower outline of the drapery is more rectangular and sweeps up more sharply as it approaches liberty's leg. Look out for altered or obliterated dates on this desirable issue if you are buying an uncertified coin.















6) What is the year date carried on the first gold coin minted for circulation by the United States?

The first gold coins from the new U.S. Mint at Philadelphia carried the date 1795. Although copper had been coined in 1793 and silver in 1794, there was a delay in getting appropriate bonds posted for the coiner and the assayer, Half Eagles (\$5) and Eagles (\$10) were produced in 1795.

7) Among U.S. Mint locations that struck coins, which ones had the lowest totals?

The U.S. Mints which had the lowest production totals before they were closed would be the two "gold only" mints at Dahlonega, Georgia and Charlotte, North Carolina. Both mints started in 1838 and closed in 1861 as the bullion supply ran out shortly after the start of the Civil War. A fairly close runner-up would be the Carson City, Nevada mint coining 1870-1893, but "CC" had the advantage of coining substantial silver as well as gold. These three mints (plus New Orleans) are the only ones to have never coined copper or bronze during their lives.

HENNING NICKEL

Francis Leroy Henning was born in 1891 in Erial, New Jersey. During the 1930's, Henning began counterfeiting \$5 bills (which had about \$100 in today's purchasing power). Henning was caught, tried, convicted and sentenced to 3 years in prison. In his second known attempt at counterfeiting and what he believed would avoid detection and suspicion, he decided to counterfeit nickels. He began with all of his nickels being dated 1944 but soon became scared when a bank teller made a comment about how unusual that all the nickels were the same date and looked the same. None of the nickels appeared uncirculated and show very little detail on the reverse of the nickel. In order to prevent suspicion, he began minting additional nickels dated 1939, 1946, 1947, and 1953. Henning was never able to get the weight correct. He also did not use silver in the war time nickels. War time nickels weighed about 5 grams but his nickels weighed up to 5.5 grams.

None of the Henning Nickels have a mint mark. All appear in very circulated condition and the most famous thing to look for on 1944 nickel is the "lopped R" in Pluribus. (On reverse). See image. The 1944 is the most sought after even though it had the highest mintage.

When Henning realized that the feds were closing in on him, he dumped between 200,000 and 400,000 nickels into the Copper River in New Jersey. (Possible face value of \$20,000). Relatively very few were recovered. The purchasing power of a nickel in the 1950s was about 50 cents in today's money.

Henning claimed he lost money because his cost for each planchet was 3 1/2 cents. He only generated about \$5,000 in revenue and on top of that he got another 3 years in prison and a \$5000 fine. Henning lost about \$7,000 which converts to about \$72,000 in today's money.

It is illegal to own counterfeit money but the secret service turns their head on these collectable nickels. Henning died in 1968 but you can only imagine how proud Henning would have been knowing some of his nickels now sell for up to \$500 each.



GERMAN HYPER INFLATION OF 1923 Chuck Nail, Gateway Coin Club of San Antonio



Pictured here is an original bundle of two-million German Marks during the Hyperinflation of 1923. At the time of issue in late 1923, this bundle of Marks was worth only a few US dollars. After the end of WW I, the devastation of German industry and the harsh demands of the Treaty of Versailles led to an Inflation of huge proportions.

At the height of the Hyperinflation, the Mark per Dollar exchange rate fluctuated daily. Even German school children knew the latest value. Workers hurried to market to purchase basic items lest their daily cash salaries lost all value. The population resorted to taking paper Marks in wheelbarrows, as it took immense amounts of bank notes for even simple goods. Devalued notes were bundled into bricks and used by children to play with.

The bank notes were printed ever larger in size, though the face value plummeted at an alarming rate. Many Inflation Marks were used as kindling in stoves or as wallpaper. Stories emerged from this time: Once a housewife placed her basket of paper Marks down to look at produce in the market, a thief ran by dumping the notes into the gutter to take off with just the basket! On one occasion a man with his suitcase full of Marks went to a cafe and set it down beside him. The waiter approached and said, "Sorry, no luggage is allowed inside." The man then replied, "That is not my luggage but my wallet!"

LEOPOLD THE HOGMOUTH Tim Conway, Liberty Coin Club





Royal effigies have long adorned world coins. These can allow the evaluation of inherited maladies hundreds or even thousands of years later. Obvious physical disorders such as goiters did appear on ancient Greek, Parthian, and Roman coins. Royal dynasties throughout the ages have inbred to maintain the "purity" of their bloodlines. This practice fostered genetic anomalies and disease. The Royal House of Habsburg, which dominated Europe from the 1400s to the early 1900s exhibited such traits.

Extreme mandibular prognathism (protruding lower jaw) can be seen in Holy Roman Emperor Leopold I (1640-1705). This condition led to the nickname "Leopold the Hogmouth," and is often referred to as the "Habsburg jaw". The resultant enlarged lower lip can be called the "Habsburg lip."

This coin is a 1677-KB Hungarian 15 Kreuzer. The portrait of Leopold I clearly shows the "Habsburg jaw" and the "Habsburg lip." The reverse depicts Madonna and Child. An interesting aspect of these coins is that they are produced by a roller mill, as opposed to being struck in the traditional sense. This gives them a bent appearance, much like a Pringles potato chip!



WESTWARD JOURNEY NICKEL SERIES

In 2004 and 2005, the Jefferson nickel featured four different designs to commemorate the bicentennials of the Louisiana Purchase and the Lewis and Clark expedition. The images were evocative of the historic expedition into the Louisiana Territory. The series was authorized by Public Law 108-15.

The U.S. Mint began the Westward Journey Nickel Series in 2004 with the release of the "Peace Medal" and "Keelboat" nickels. The Louisiana Purchase / Peace Medal reverse, Mint sculptor Norman E. Nemeth, was adapted from the reverse of the original Indian Peace medals commissioned for the expedition. These medals bore a portrait of President Thomas Jefferson on one side and symbols of peace and friendship on the other. They were presented to Native American chiefs and other important leaders as tokens of the good will of the United States. The Keelboat reverse, Mint sculptor Al Maletsky, depicts the boat that transported the Lewis and Clark expedition and their supplies through the

rivers of the Louisiana Territory. Built to Captain Lewis's specifications, the 55 foot craft could be sailed, rowed, poled like a raft or towed from the river banks. In 2005, a new likeness of Thomas Jefferson appeared on the obverse again in recognition of his role in the Louisiana Purchase and commissioning the Lewis and Clark expedition. The "American bison" reverse was representative of the wildlife encountered by the expedition. The second coin of 2005 depicted a scene of the Pacific Ocean, highlighting the expedition's exultation on believing they had finally reached the Pacific Ocean after many months of travel.

These coin are not as valuable as others but have sparked my curiosity because of their shine and clarity. The attention to detail is also impressive. Please note some of the coins have increased in value because of minting mark errors. An example each year of mintage of these coins total around 300 million coins from the Philadelphia and Denver mints but only 3 million proof sets were created in the San Francisco mint causing the coin to be more valuable. There are several 2004 P Keelboat Jefferson nickels with major improper annealing. There are several 2004 P Keelboat Jefferson nickels with reverse die gouge.

Characteristics of the 2004 Keelboat coin

Obverse (heads), Designer Felix Schlag: Bears the likeness of Thomas Jefferson used on the nickel since 1938.

Reverse (tails), Designer Al Maletsky: Features an angled, side-view of the keelboat with full sail that transported members of the Lewis and Clark expedition. Captains Meriwether Lewis and William Clark are in full uniform in the bow.

MANILLA


Manillas were a form of commodity money, usually made of bronze or copper. They originated in Calabar, a chief city on the ancient southeast Nigerian coast. It was here in 1505 that a slave could be bought for 8-10 manillas and an elephant's tooth for one copper manilla.

By the early 16th century, it was common in the slave trade for bearers to carry manillas to Africa's coast, and gradually manillas became the principal currency of the slave trade. The Portuguese, British, French, and Dutch, all had labor-intensive plantations in the West Indies. A typical voyage took manillas and

brass objects such as pans and basins to Western Africa where they were exchanged for slaves. The price of a slave expressed in manillas varied considerably according to time, place, and the specific type of manillas offered.

The metals preferred were originally copper, then brass at about the end of the 15th century, and finally bronze in about 1630. The manilla, a lingering reminder of the slave trade, ceased to be legal tender in British West Africa on April 1, 1949.







2020 MEXICAN SILVER LIBERTAD Matt B., Liberty Coin Club of San Antonio

This is a five-ounce 2020 Mexican silver Libertad. It is a beautiful coin that features an image of an eagle with a rattlesnake in its beak on the reverse. When the Aztecs saw this scene with the eagle and the rattlesnake unfold, they decided to build their city at that place. This event was a major part of the history of Mexico. On the obverse, the winged liberty statue

is shown. In the background of liberty is the Mexican volcanoes, Popocatépetl and Iztaccíhuatl. According to APMEX, this coin has a mintage of 2,950 and very few of these with a grade proof seventy (NGC Population is only 93).

LOVE TOKENS

Frank Galindo, President, Gateway Coin Club, San Antonio, TX





Love Tokens are not really tokens. They are coins that have been smoothed, usually on one side, and have engraved initials, names, scenes, or other types of messages or engravings. Some engravers would create very simple designs on their coins using mostly initials without any decorative patterns.

Other artists would use "triple-overlapping initials" designs which were intricate and ornate. This would involve using three letters engraved above each another, thus, often creating an interlinking configuration. The widest letter mostly signified the surname, while the largest represented the first name.

Engravers used practically all denominations of coins to create Love Tokens. Some engravers made Love Token bracelets which were a popular form of jewelry. This would require eight coins usually using the silver Seated Liberty dime. Nickel and copper cents were also used but silver because it is a softer metal was preferred by the engravers.

Love Tokens have existed for a long time. One source states that the creation and custom of giving a Love Token may have originated in Great Britain in the early 1800s. Later in the late 1800s, the custom was adopted in the United States. About the time of the Civil War, the Love Tokens became a common custom. Love Tokens express an emotion or celebrate an important event. During the Civil War, soldiers would engrave coins to carry as dog tags or to send as a keepsake to their sweethearts back home.

In the late 1500s, the French performed a wedding tradition known as Treizain, a set of engraved coins which were blessed by a priest performing the ceremony. The priest then gave them to the groom to present to his bride during the wedding ceremony.

The Love Token shown in the photo is an 1853 silver Seated Liberty quarter, variety 2. This quarter was designed by Christian Gobrecht. During 1853 several changes were made including the reduction of the silver to discourage melting the recently struck coins. The Mint needed a way to distinguish these new and lighter coins from the earlier issues, so arrows and rays were added to the reverse.

This coin's reverse shows the initials C H in the center of a stylized cross. Around the cross is a decorative design in the field that completes and enhances the design.

NAMIBIA 50 CENTS COIN

The Republic of Namibia was once the German colonial territory of German Southwest Africa. Namibia achieved its independence on March 12, 1990. Namibia is located on the Atlantic Ocean. It's bounded to the north by Angola, on the east by Botswana and on the south by South Africa.

The 1993 50 cents coin, KM# 3, is composed of nickel plated steel. The obverse shows Namibia national arms while the reverse depicts the Quiver tree at right, partial sun design on upper left, and the value below. I was drawn to this coin by the Quiver tree. This tree gets its English common name from the San people who once used the tree's thinner branches as quivers to carry arrows.







ISLE OF JERSEY HISTORICAL ITEM Rick Ewing, President of the TNA

A shortage of coinage on the Isle of Jersey was partly caused by the occupying German forces took a lot of the cons as souvenirs. The occupying German forces enacted a Currency Notes of Jersey Law on April 29, 1941. These banknotes were designed by Edmund Blampied and issued in denominations of 6 Pence, 1, 2, and 10 Shillings. In defiance of the German Forces, he designed the 6 pence in such a way that when folded the word SIX formed with an oversized X the result was the resistance symbol "V" for victory.

It was reported that at the end of the war when the Isle was liberated, the population of the Isle gathered with their occupational currency, and, in a last defiant gesture of the people, they burned the now thought-to-be worthless paper money. Unhappily, an additional event happened to these islanders. An official of the Bank of England had been directed to redeem all the occupational currency as a gesture of atonement for not being able to protect its Crown's Citizenry from the German occupation. This redemption was unprecedented, but those who burned their currency were not able to participate.

GERMAN 3 REICHSMARK COMMEMORATING 10TH ANNIVERSARY OF WEIMAR CONSTITUTION David A., Liberty Coin Club of San Antonio







Reverse: Circle containing hand with two fingers and thumb raised and dates below

I am fascinated with the 1919-1945 period of German history and its parallels with current events. One of the most enigmatic silver coins from this period has to be the 0.500 fine silver, 3 Reichsmark piece issued by the Staatliche Münze Baden-Württemberg, Karlsruhe Mint (G) celebrating the 10th anniversary of the Weimar Republic, which is shown here.

The obverse is translated as "German Empire - 3 Reichsmark - Hindenburg President of the Empire," and the reverse is translated as "Faithful to the Constitution 1919-1929 - 11 August." The lettering inscripted on the edge (not shown) is EINIGKEIT UND RECHT UND FREIHEIT, which translates as "Unity and Justice and Freedom." The obverse features Paul von Hindenburg, a much beloved German field marshal and statesman who lived from October 2, 1847 – August 2, 1934. After President Hindenburg's death, Adolf Hitler declared the office vacant and declared himself the "Fuehrer", which combined the offices of president and chancellor.

The enigma concerns the hand with the two raised fingers and thumb. With a little research I found that this symbol represented the German people swearing to uphold the Constitution of the Weimar Republic, which declared Germany to be a democratic parliamentary republic. Technically speaking this constitution remained in effect during the Third Reich up until 1945. This coin recently sold for \$44.00 on eBay.

2001 1¢ error, Joe: 1910 \$1000 German Mark, Pat: 2013 newspaper article on Star Notes. Program: "The Dr. Jerry Buss Collection" By Jose S. Dr. Buss bought the Los Angeles Lakers in 1979 and ... He grew the team into an international brand. ... Today's program is on the famed coin collection of Dr. Jerry Buss. He collected over 40 years and some of his most famous purchases were made by signing a hot dog napkin. The lot was comprised of 2,200 lots auctioned by Superior Galleries January of 1985. The total collection realized just over \$4MM. While too large to discuss in detail I will cover the three most significant coins he owned. The 1913 Liberty Head 5¢ was sold for \$350K to Texas collector Reed Hawn and graded PF 63. This was acquired from Fred Olsen in 1941 who had purchased it from Eric P. Newman. Newman had owned all previous five examples. The Olsen piece had also been owned by King Farouk I of Egypt, Edwin Hydeman and later Dr. Buss. After Dr. Buss ownership passed to Hawn, Spectrum Numismatics and Legend Numismatics. The coin also appeared on an episode of Hawaii Five-O. Dr. Buss bought the coin for \$200,000. In May 2004 Legend Numismatics sold the coin for \$3MM. The 1894 S PF 10¢ is an impaired Proof. Described as Brilliant Proof 60 and one of only nine or ten examples known. It was sold for\$50,600 to actress Michelle Johnson and she was the underbidder for the 1913 Liberty 5¢. The 1804 Draped Bust dollar was a class III coin once owned by William Idler. Numismatists recognize three types. From 1868 to 1908 William Idler owned the coin and Dr. Buss purchased

it for \$200,000. Nebraska dealer Aubrey Bebee and his wife Adeline paid

\$308,000 for the coin in the Buss auction. It was donated to the ANA in 1991. Often visible on coin show bourse floors and was described as unassuming,

gracious, and down to earth, Buss had hoped to assemble a collection that

would rival the collection assembled by Louis E. Eliasberg. Many Raffle and

Door Prizes were won.

PROGRAM: "Maundy Money" by Richard L. Richard L. shared his experience of living in Northern Ireland as a child. He lived in a house built in the mid 18th Century, the house had a penny meter for gas. The city would eventually come to collect the coins. They mainly used old Pence from 1899. This spurred his interest in Queen Victoria coins and he also started collecting US type. Richard forgot about US coins until about 15 years ago. His focus now is on "Maundy" coins. The root of "Maundy" tradition comes out of Christian history. Maundy Thursday was the day before the crucifixion, which in the Synoptic Gospel was the Last Passover Supper. This according to the gospel included the washing the feet of the disciples. The word Maundy is believed to be from the Latin word "Mandatum"- meaning to follow a "command" which in this case was "to love one another". Early church practice-from the 9th century forward included gifts and the ritual washing of feet. During the reign of Henry VIII (1531-1547) the practice became less common. During the 17th century with a focus on King Charles II-the Royal Maundy with coin distribution and the washing of the feet of selected poor people. In the 20th Century there was the return of direct monarch participation (George V). Maundy coins were never issued in large quantity. Charles II- in order to show the compassion of monarchy pulled coins out of circulation (four denominations) which were given to select "poor" as in earlier times. The number of coins given was associated with the age of the monarch. At that time 10 pence had some buying power for food and other essentials. Also given were food and clothing. Coin distribution today includes a white pouch and red pouchcoins in the white pouch is 5 pound 50 pence in the red, still related to age of monarch, were pennies according to the age of the monarch. Coins given in sets of four (10 years of age of king/queen- with extras) passed out on Maundy Thursday-with annual shift of locations to different churches. In 2008 it took place for the first time in Northern Ireland at Armagh Cathedral. The Number of sets generally not more than 1200 to 1500 All who receive get "A Set" which come in leather bags. Boxes came later. The weight of each

set hasn't changed through the years. Those in history and today are .104 (Sterling)... from 1921 to 1946 .0755. Mintage while usually low, there have been on occasion special mintage such as 2000. The coins are not always given to the poor but to those who serve the poor. The Coins in sets are rarely available to the collector market through the mint. For most Maundy sets, less than 1500 were issued. Many Raffle and Door Prizes were won by those in attendance at the meeting.


APPLICATION


